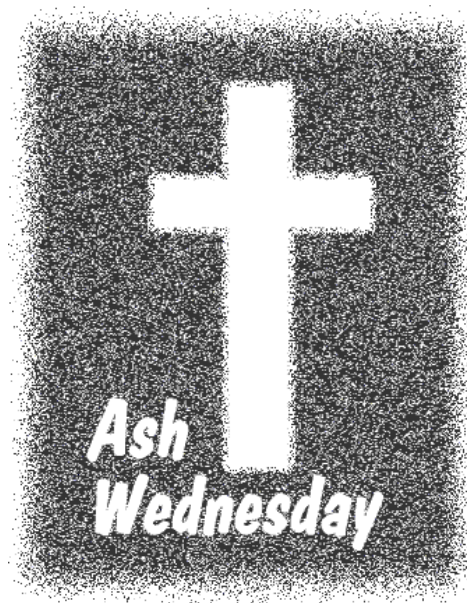

“The Church of the Future”

We sometimes hear of the demise of the Church. I would like to share with you some encouraging information of life and growth which I read about in an article in the Church of England Newspaper at the end of last year.

“I have been to the church of the future”. This was a comment made by an English visitor to the Anglican Church of St. George in Baghdad. He was impressed and enthralled. St. George’s is obviously an amazing church, one which flourishes and grows. The vicar, Canon Andrew White, who suffers from increasingly indifferent health, has sacrificed his comforts, his home and his safety to build up in the Christian faith and to care for the group of believers in one of the most dangerous places in the world: a place where the Christian Church is suppressed and often persecuted. To attend church as an Iraqi is not without risk, and so the believers at St. George’s are a fine example to us of commitment to Jesus Christ.

Andrew describes his regular journey to church: “We were seated in the usual armoured vehicle going through countless checkpoints until we were finally out of the international zone. We were then met by further Iraqi military with soldiers front and back of us in open-backed vehicles with guns pointing in all directions. The sirens started screeching ... for me this was just another normal trip to church in the usual abnormal manner”. He goes on to describe the nature of the church: “The services are always filled with joy, yet at every meeting people will tell of the pain they have suffered that week. The church is bursting at the seams; there are not enough seats for everyone so they stand for several hours at a time”. The English visitor comments that, at St. George’s Church, denominations do not matter, and people from every denominational background come together to worship the living God – “A people who have lost everything and realise that Jesus is everything”.

“Jesus is everything”. That, I think, is the secret of the life at St. George’s. Those who belong there have a vibrant faith in the Living Lord which is relevant, joyful and powerful. Whether we are in Baghdad or in one of our peaceful rural parishes this same life is available to all. As Christian believers we are all part of the one worldwide church serving the same Lord. Here, in our situation, we have so many blessings and

opportunities, without the fear of suppression and persecution, so let us grasp the moment. As we work together to maintain our local churches during a vacancy, may we care for one another and face the future with the same confidence as those faithful Christian souls in Baghdad.

Rose's Ramblings

Prayer in a concrete bunker



Prayer is so critical to our hopes and dreams, whether personally or over the Ashbourne area, and there is no doubt that prayer is critical to receiving God's blessing on our work and seeing wonders happen before our eyes. And yet so many times we feel 'what happened to that prayer?' and search for the answers we are sure must be there.

May I humbly suggest a couple of ways which might help us see God's movement more clearly.

The first blockage is when we pray such general prayers such as for 'peace' or 'youth work' etc. How can we know when these prayers are answered? There may be an answer for our prayer in one corner of the world where there is a day blessed with less fighting than would otherwise happen, or that a young person draws close to someone who can make a difference to them – but how will we know that? The prayer is too general to see the answer.

We need to pray very specific prayers and then we can see the solid answer. Keeping a prayer diary is a great way to see God's hand at work. Writing down what we have prayed for and then alongside writing the answers and responses which may not come exactly as we expect them, but nevertheless show God's answers in their relevance to our requests.

Secondly, we sometimes pray in a limited way – or – we pray in a concrete bunker. We put limitations on God's power and only accept help in certain ways. I've seen this happen where the person prays for something to

happen but doesn't allow God to surprise them or doesn't open enough possibilities to see God act. When I went to Sri Lanka the first time alone, knowing no-one, I decided to say 'no' to nothing – as I was sure of God's leading and blessing in all areas. I had to open the rooftop to allow God's blessings to exceed my own limited imagination, and He continues to do that on every trip.

We must be careful not to limit God by refusing to be open to new experiences, unanticipated ways of doing things – or unexpected people who might bless us. Imagine the wounded man refusing to let the Good Samaritan touch him because he didn't conform to what was considered appropriate at that time!

There is much prayer being answered in a multiplicity of ways at the moment. I would ask your continued prayer for God's touch answering specific needs in the lives of named young people known to you within and outside our churches. Also for more adults to be inspired, motivated and raised up to work with young people in the diverse ways we desperately need.

Do try writing down your prayers – and be overwhelmed at the generous Heavenly response!

**UPDATE FROM
YOUR LOCAL OFFICER
February 2009**

We have a few bits to report this month. A couple of crimes, a road traffic collision, a bit of nuisance, and a very enjoyable evening.

Overnight on the 29th January 2009 the Bentley Brook Inn was broken into and items stolen. Some of the stolen property was found abandoned at Cubley. Staffordshire have also suffered a number of burglaries, and car crimes that are similar to ours. We have had some extra patrols out, at the same time as Staffs Police, to try and combat this and gain intelligence and trace possible offenders.

Suspicious callers at an address in Kniveton were reported to us on 30th January. This is in an area where we have had similar reports before, Ashbourne side of the village. A few days later we had a similar call in Ashbourne. Police attended and checked out a number of people, who were legitimate callers. Some motoring offences were dealt with and they were given advice about the timing of their calls. Please keep reporting suspicious people and incidents. I appreciate it can frustrate people when I ask you to keep doing this, and we don't always get out to your reports because of other incidents occurring at the same time. We do appreciate the calls, and they are very worthwhile. Your call may just be the one with a bit of luck attached that brings in a really good result.

At around 8pm on 1st February 2009, a vehicle collided with a stationary Ford Escort parked in Tissington. The offending vehicle failed to stop and made off towards the Ford area. The owner of the Escort has had their car written off, will have to cover the excess on the Insurance, and had the inconvenience a collision brings. Had the person stopped, left details, it may not have been a Police issue. If anyone has any information, saw anything that may relate to this, please let me know. Also at Tissington around the 4th February 2009, we had a number of Chickens stolen from a coup. A similar incident has occurred over in Staffordshire.

In recent weeks during a meeting at Thorpe Village Hall, on a number of occasions the meeting was disturbed by someone throwing clods of earth at the door. A number of boys have been spoken to after a similar incident at Mappleton and been given advice about their behaviour. We are very fortunate in that we have very little nuisance behaviour in our villages, and we do want to try and keep it that way. Please report any such problems to us, at the time it occurs, if at all possible, so we can try and nip it in the bud.

We have just had a group of Cyberscouts at the Police Station for a tour of the enquiry office and cell area. Many of the children were from some of our villages, and they had the chance to see handcuffs, CS gas, Police Dogs, Vehicles and an old fashioned Truncheon and whistles. We took photos, fingerprints (for them to take home) and I think we enjoyed it as much as they did.

Our next Community Forum is to be held at Kniveton Village Hall, on the evening of 12th March 2009. Everyone is welcome to attend.

Finally around early February I went to see Gordon Giltrap at Thorpe Village Hall. It was a tremendous night, a brilliant guitarist in an excellent setting and atmosphere. I am now just hoping someone manages to get Slade (with Noddy Holder), or Camel (I bet not many have heard of them), at their local venue.

Organ Appeal

As you may be aware from your visits to St Michael's, the existing electric organ, donated by the Bunting family in 1975 in memory of William John Bunting, has now reached the end of its useful working life. Unfortunately the instrument is beginning to fail, with some notes and stops no longer functioning. We were advised at its last service that it is no longer repairable and will therefore have to be replaced.

It would be impossible to imagine the weekly worship at this beautiful little church, not to mention the weddings, baptisms and funeral services, continuing without the music provided by a suitable replacement instrument. After much research we have found such an instrument in the Viscount Vivace 30/30. This is an electronic organ, similar in size and appearance to the one it will replace, but such have been the technical advances in recent years that it will sound like a traditional church pipe organ, only for approximately a tenth of the cost. It will require virtually no maintenance over a life expectancy of another thirty years.

We have negotiated a price of £4150 as long as we can complete purchase in the next six months.

We very much hope you will be able to support our appeal and thereby help to maintain the key role played by music in the church's life. **If you can be of any help, please contact the church wardens.**

ST. PETER'S CHURCH---"A CELEBRATION OF THE FIVE CHURCHES"

A very large number of people from the Benefice gathered in St. Peter's Church on Sunday morning Feb. 8th not only to attend Rev. Christopher Harrison's final Service but also to express their appreciation of his ministry among us over the past 12 or so years. Both our patrons, Mr. Donald Shields and Sir Richard Fitzherbert were present as was Rev. Tim Morris of the Ashbourne Methodist Church and the Rev, Mair Bradley representing the Ashbourne Churches Together.

In his celebration of our five churches and their parishes the Vicar reflected on their differing aspects, people and annual events, which, he said, will long remain in his memory. Prayers were said in thanksgiving both for the Benefice and the Deanery over which he has presided as Rural Dean and Tim Morris reminded the congregation of his gratitude when the

Vicar had warmly welcomed the Methodists last May upon closure of the chapel allowing them use of the Lady Chapel for their Services.

The Vicar then dedicated a new Kneeler for use in the church which incorporated his name and the years that he had served here and in conclusion blessed the Readers and Churchwardens that “they might work to build God’s kingdom of love and justice in their parishes.” The Choir sang a closing anthem and a final hymn brought the Service to an end.

Everyone then relaxed as presentations were made to Christopher by Tim Morris on behalf of the local Methodists and, with the assistance of the Patrons, by representatives of Thorpe, Alsop, Parwich and Tissington churches which included a painting of the inside of Thorpe church, a smart, new sound system and photos of the respective churches which will doubtless be a reminder of his days amongst the rural beauty and people of the White Peak. Summary of Minutes of the meeting held on 19th January 2009

Welcome The Chair welcomed everyone to the meeting.

Minutes of the last meeting held on 3rd November 2008 were approved and signed by the Chair.

Matters arising from the minutes

The planning application for Home Farm had been passed with the marquee at Tissington Hall not determined. Peak Park querying parking.

The drains at Fern Cottage had been repaired but not at Sharplow Cottage, this drain only affected in very wet weather.

No communication had been received in respect of Lea Hall merger.

Financial Report

Playing Field Reimbursable Expenditure maximum claim £430.00 by letter including copy invoices from LMS.

Planning Application

Shardaroba Woodeaves – a retrospective application to replace outbuildings and greenhouse. A reply was sent on 24th December stating Council had no objections.

PDNP – Parish Council E-consultation Survey was completed and stated the Council would be interested in trailing electronic consultation in the future.

Highway Maintenance

Sign knocked over on the hill near the ford, DCC had written stating instruction had been given for its replacement. Clerk to write expressing concern over length of time this repair had taken.

Ford – No reply had been received from DCC or Environmental Agency in respect of the condition of the ford. Clerk to write again to DCC and Environmental Agency and notify Ashbourne News Telegraph of this problem.

A515 Rakes Lane junction to The Avenue Junction. Problems with branches and bushes overhanging the highway. The council are aware that trees and bushes growing on the landowner's property was the responsibility of the landowners. Clerk to write to DCC asking for removal of brushes growing between highway and wall.

Cattle Grids The grid nearest the village had been repaired with metal plates again. Councillors stated the serious condition that both sets of grids were in and they were now beyond repair. Clerk to write to DCC asking for their renewal.

It was also noted that the repairs/renewals of the pillars on The Avenue entrance was imminent.

Correspondence

DDDC had written in respect of paper recycling at Tissington site. The waste management and recycling officer had visited the site on 31st October and was concerned with the level of contamination in container for paper. An article to be placed in parish magazine drawing attention to acceptable paper materials. A further letter from DDDC had been received stating a new blue 'igloo' type paper bank had been delivered to the site at Tissington.

DDDC Parish Council Conference to be held at Ashbourne Leisure Centre on 17th February. Two councillors to attend.

Freedom of Information Act New Model Publication Scheme

Details were added to the Model Scheme. A minimum charge of £20.00 plus expenses to be made.

A public place for display of literature and information was required. The Church Council to be asked for permission to place a loose-leaf folder display at the rear of the Church.

A summary of Council minutes to be published in Parish Magazine.

Dates of next meetings had previously been arranged for 23rd March 2009 and 6th April 2009 when the Annual Parish Meeting would be held.

Derbyshire Dales District Council – Paper Recycling Site at Tissington

The Derbyshire Dales District Council have written following a visit by the Waste Management and Recycling Officer on Friday 31st October 2008. He was concerned at the level of contamination in the container for paper. The main contaminant was cardboard which can be put into the Council's green bins.

The acceptable paper materials are: newspapers, magazines, postal advertising, white envelopes, telephone directories including Yellow Pages and catalogues.

The materials which are NOT acceptable are paper bags, cardboard, brown paper, plastic wrapping and brown envelopes.
