Remembrance Sunday will soon be here. It gives us a good opportunity to reflect, and to realise again that the peace and freedom, which we all enjoy and need to preserve, were bought for us at enormous cost.

Having made a number of trips to the First World War battlefields and war cemeteries in Northern France and Flanders, I am always struck by the moving epitaphs on the white grave stones. One grave which we have visited and find particularly moving is that of Noel Godfrey Chavasse, which lies in the little village cemetery of Brandhoek, between the towns of Poperinge and Ypres. Noel was a doctor in the Royal Army Medical Corps, attached to the King's Liverpool Regiment. His father was the then Bishop of Liverpool. Noel Chavasse died as a result of wounds on August 4th, 1917 and was awarded two Victoria Crosses for outstanding bravery – one of only three people ever to receive the double award, which is called the Victoria Cross and Bar. His was a prize example of courage, selflessness and endurance and showed that the human spirit, though daunted, is not defeated when “the going gets tough”. As a Christian believer, Noel died full of hope and confidence in God.

In 1917 there were two citations, entries, in the London Gazette concerning Noel Chavasse, which describe him and what he did in the field of battle. As a doctor he searched for the wounded; he attended the wounded; he carried the wounded; he rescued the wounded; he saved the lives of many men.

The epitaph of Noel's grave, presumably chosen by his parents, quotes some familiar words of Jesus Christ from the Gospel of the Apostle John. **“Greater love hath no man than this, that a man lay down his life for his friends.”** (St. John chapter 14: verse 13) These words remind us of Jesus Himself and of His death for us on the first Good Friday. Jesus' life was, historically and eternally, the supreme example of love and of a life laid down in costly sacrifice. The Good News of the Christian Gospel is that God's love is still available for us sinners today, searching for us, longing to rescue us from failure and meaninglessness. And for those who respond to such love is given the assurance and the confidence of eternity, which Noel Chavasse held on to and treasured in the horror and confusion of war and in his life of service and sacrifice.

As I write BST has just ended, the countryside is wreathed in mist and the leaves are falling—a typical November day! At the start of the month the Christian Church pauses to remember with gratitude both the Saints and Souls who have preceded us.

Our parish churches celebrate their own patron Saint during the year but there are of course thousands of Saints from Augustine to Wenceslas who have gone before us, setting an example by their Christian faith, sometimes enduring hardship, persecution and even martyrdom because of that faith and November 1st provides us with the chance to say thank you.

Then there are the millions of those who have fought a good fight and now ‘rejoice with us, but upon another shore and in a clearer light.’ Just a few of these are very special to each of us and November 2nd is the day to thank God for them and the influence they may have had on our lives.

This month also provides us with the opportunity to remember those who have given their lives in various fields of conflict in order that we might enjoy the peace of the past 60 years or so. This year many will gather round their memorials on Sunday the 8th with the difficult situation in Afghanistan uppermost in their minds.

Finally, the month closes with the start of the Advent season on the 29th when the Church prepares to celebrate the day when God’s Son came into the world- a time therefore of looking forward, a time to remember the Birthday of Jesus Christ, the Saviour of Mankind, who came in love and also has promised to return in His own time.

So, as suggested by the writer of the New Testament Book of Hebrews, ‘let us remember the large crowd of witnesses all around us,’ both Saints and Souls and, ‘be determined to run the race that is ahead of us keeping our eyes on Jesus who now leads us and makes our faith complete.’

Dear Resident

Since the 22 September there has not been a great deal to report on the area. On the 5 October an isolated building at a company on Alsop Road Parwich had an attempted entry, nothing was taken all contents remained intact. Later in the month on the 19 October several rocks were taken from a wall at Newton Grange, still under investigation.

Sometime between 3.45pm, on Thursday 22nd October and 8 am on Friday 23rd October 2009, an orange flashing beacon has been taken from the edge of the FitzHerbert Primary School Car Park, on School Close, Fenny Bentley. The beacon was there to help people clearly see the edge of the ongoing building works, and was on hire. The school will still have to cover the cost of its loss. If anyone has any idea as to its whereabouts please let me, or the school, know. If it simply reappears it would be a big help.

Any information concerning the above would be appreciated. Please remember if you see, hear, or are told about someone that is acting suspiciously, or causing a nuisance, please make a note of any details. Registration numbers, descriptions are all very helpful. Please ring us if possible, at the time. You do not have to give your details, you may be asked for them but you can decline and remain anonymous. The most important thing is that the information is passed on.

We continue to have an area that is low on crime and anti-social behaviour. In relation to this it continues to be one the best areas in the country to live.

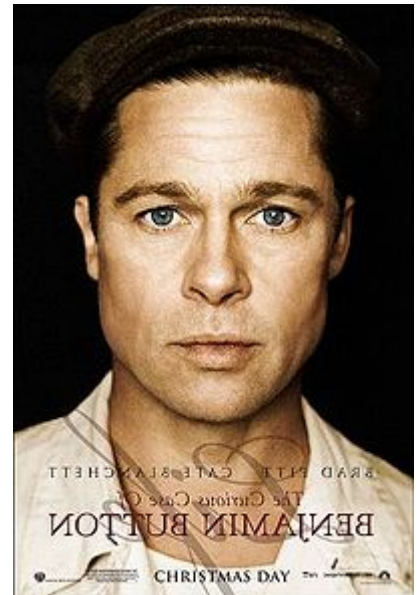

Minutes of the meeting on 3rd August 2009 had been circulated and were signed as correct.

Matters arising from the minutes

Warning sign on trail e-mail from PDNP – traffic sign under schedule 1 needs permission of landowner. No formal application to Peak Park necessary. Neither the authority nor Parish Council would be consulted. Further information if required from highways authority DDDC.

Grit Bins Jane Barwick DCC confirmed details of August meeting in respect of two extra grit bins and provided criteria for salt bin provision together with cost to Parish Councils of salt and/or salt bins. Also reply from Councillor Chris Jackson DCC (10 Sept) confirming scheme. Councillors very much against incurring any expense.

Appeal Decision re planning application at Brookwood Farm – Appeal dismissed.

DCC response reference Highway Maintenance

Avenue Gates referred to traffic and road safety section for investigation

Cattle Grids repairs carried out and hopefully funds available 2009/2010 financial year to renew grids

Ford work instruction sheet issued to carry out repairs.

Village of Year competition won by Bonsall and Elton

Severn Trent the course for the pipeline renewal between Bradbourne and Tissington may be over land and not follow road.

Rubbish Collection over Bank Holiday periods DDDC had replied stating that collections would be timetabled for future holiday periods.

Planning Applications for Hoopers Barn. These applications had been approved by the Council with the comment that they were disappointed at the development being for holiday accommodation and would prefer them to be for short term let.

The Audit Commission after requesting copy bank and reconciliation statements had returned the approved return and the appropriate notices would be displayed.

Precept –this item to be carried forward to next meeting when information available on policing level.

Highway Maintenance The closure of the B5056 at Fenny Bentley had increased the volume of traffic passing through the village and hence added to several on going maintenance issues.

Repairs to the Ford were now being made. ‘Time running out’ for the cattle grids on the avenue nearest the village, although repaired recently, were in urgent need of renewal. Gates to cattle grids on the A515 junction were in need of repair/renewal, gates not fastening and cattle straying. Urgent attention needed before further incidents occur. It was also reported that the gate to cattle grid on Darfields nearest to village was not swinging or shutting properly again with cattle straying.

Clerk to write to DCC reporting problems.

Grit Bins Clerk to write to DCC saying no to scheme Council not prepared to undertake any funding of grit or bins. DCC to be made aware of the need for this road between Ford and Village to be gritted during poor weather, with the closure of the B056 it was now part of a bus route and included in the Mill Field cycle route. This stretch of road is narrow and problems are occurring when vehicles cannot pass easily. Passing place points need to be made and signed. DCC to be informed of problem.

Correspondence

BT invitation to adopt Telephone Kiosk – to be carried forward to next meeting.

Any other business

Parking issues problems are occurring at busy weekends especially when Craft Fairs are held in the Village Hall. Traffic especially tractors and lorries have difficulty negotiating through the village. Clerk to write to Highways Authority DCC to report problem and ask for a traffic survey to be taken at a busy week end during the summer months.

The Village Hall Committee were calling a meeting in respect of the future of the Village Hall and car parking provisional booked for Wednesday 25th November.
